With that being said I put on my creative thinking cap and starting in July partnered with a unlikely partner to deliver services to the community, I partnered with Community Care of WV.

Brief Description of Activity/Project

By partnering with Community Care, my county will get BCCSP, FP services such as annual pap & pelvic exams, but they bill for the service of this clinical aspect & myself & staff will bill for the education, follow-ups and interim visits, but the provider will come to my office and not utilize any staff but a RN to do the education & dispensing of medication or just education. BCHD will actually will come out ahead by not having to add another clinician to our budget or pay OT or have staff adjusting.

This agency is one of the largest health services in our county and instead of fighting them, I am working with them to help improve the quality of health care and services that my county receives and how it is provided.

I can also ensure that the agency staff is educated on vaccine preventable disease and how to report diseases to the state and county agencies.

Impact/Outcome

Clinics will be offered more frequently and consistently & be able to increase its volume and provide education to patients that might necessarily get plus patients who have insurance now can still go to the health department, where they are comfortable coming for services. Decrease the number of STDs and unplanned pregnancies in the county.
